Council passes motion opposing locating Waste to Energy facility in Nanaimo

Letter to be sent to Metro Vancouver and Province outlining the City's position

Summary

At its regular meeting held April 14, Council passed a motion to formally oppose locating a proposed Metro Vancouver garbage processing Waste to Energy facility within the boundaries of Nanaimo and requested that the City be removed from the competitive process associated with this proposal. A letter outlining the City's position, along with copies of all correspondence (both against and in favour of the proposal) will be sent to Metro Vancouver and the Province of British Columbia.

Strategic Link: The City of Nanaimo supports efforts to obtain public input on topics of community interest.

Key Points

- Nanaimo's City Council joins the Regional District of Nanaimo's Board in opposing the siting of the proposed garbage processing Waste to Energy facility in Nanaimo.
- Nanaimo's City Council does not control the outcome of this process; it is only able to state its support or nonsupport. Metro Vancouver may still wish to proceed in bringing a facility to Nanaimo.
- The decision to bring forward this motion bares no reflection on the quality of the application associated with Wheelebrator, Seaspan or Urbaser.
- The challenge of waste disposal is not limited to Metro Vancouver the issue of what to do with waste must be addressed on Vancouver Island also and all options will need to be explored.
