On Saturday, March 24 at 8:30 pm, people are encouraged to to turn off the lights for one hour to show support for climate change. This worldwide event is called Earth Hour.

This year, the City of Nanaimo will continue to support this event and raise awareness about what we all can do, no matter how small, in saving energy and lowering greenhouse gas emissions in our community. To honour Earth Hour, we hope you join us for a Starlight Skate from 7:00 - 9:00 pm at the Nanaimo Ice Centre.

The skate is one activity among many, happening over the Month of March, where Nanaimo & district is celebrating Water to Earth Month, with several events such as stream walks, a Nanaimo river watershed tour and river rafting.

Quick Facts

- In 2007 Earth Hour started as a grassroots movement in Sydney, Australia encouraging people to turn off lights, TVs and household appliances for one hour to increase awareness of climate change and to educate about little changes that can be made to reduce carbon emissions.
- In 2017, 187 countries & territories participated and 3,100 landmarks and monuments switched off their lights.
 Millions of individuals, businesses and organizations across seven continents stepped forward to change climate change.
- As part of the City's strategic energy management plan, a combination of energy and Green-House-Gas
 reducing projects were completed in 2017. Projects include New LED lighting, Continuous Optimization
 Program recommissioning, and cool water ice-resurfacing installations at several of its' facilities. These
 projects saved 787,878 kWh of electricity, 3,876 GJ of natural gas and 215 tons of CO2e.

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
