Pedestrian Safety Day: Heads up. Phones down.

The City partners with the RCMP and ICBC to host Pedestrian Safety Day

Summary

As Daylight Savings Time came to an end this week, the days are getting shorter and the weather is turning cold and wet. Together, these factors can greatly impact pedestrian safety. To help everybody stay safe this winter, the City, the RCMP and ICBC are hosting a Pedestrian Safety Day at the intersection of Bowen Road and Dufferin Crescent on Friday, November 9, between 2:30 pm and 4:30 pm.

The risks of distracted driving are well known, but pedestrian awareness while walking is also extremely important. Distracted walking is a dangerous activity. Pedestrians need to focus on being present; heads up, phones down and headphones off when crossing the street and interacting with vehicles on the road.

"Forty-three percent of all crashes where a pedestrian gets injured happen in just four months of the year (October to January) as visibility and conditions worsen. When driving, we need to take a break from our phones, be extra alert at intersections and be ready to yield the right-of-way. When walking, we need to help drivers see us by staying focused on the road and making eye contact with drivers."
