Let's Pull Together, Nanaimo!

Residents invited to participate in invasive plant work parties

Summary

The signs of spring are popping up everywhere, including native blooms such as Fawn Lilies, Camas and Sea Blush. It's at this time of year that the City of Nanaimo works with many community groups on invasive plants in out parks and offer our "drop zones", where we accept invasive plants from homeowners for disposal as a way to encourage and raise awareness of the impact of invasive plants in our parks and natural areas.

Invasive plants have the potential to negatively impact local ecosystems. Plants, such as English ivy, Scotch broom and Himalayan blackberry are well established in Nanaimo while others, such as Knotweed and Giant Hogweed are relatively new but can have a severe negative impact on residents. Volunteer work parties with with City staff at various locations throughout the City, including Linley Valley Park, Bowen Park, Serauxmen Field and Pipers Lagoon Park. Additionally, residents who remove invasive plants from their own property can bring them to the two drop zones for safe disposal.

- Residents can drop off invasive plants they have removed from their property at two drop zones. The first is scheduled at Linley Gyro Park on Saturday, May 4 from 10 - 2 pm and the second will take place at Bowen Park (off Wall St) on Saturday, June 1 from 10 am - 2 pm.
