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Clarifying the Role of Bylaw Enforcement During COVID-19

Summary

The Province declared a Provincial State of Emergency on March 18, 2020 in response to the threat of the COVID-19 Virus. Since that date, a number of Ministerial Orders have been issued to control and slow the spread of the virus.

Both Provincial Health Officers and local Bylaw Officers have been asked to provide assistance for compliance and enforcement of Orders around the following specific items:

- Provincial Health Officers will be monitoring all food premises, including restaurants, mobile food vendors, and grocery stores as well as personal service establishments and pools.
- Municipal Bylaw Enforcement Officers will oversee and report infractions associated with community facilities such as community halls, museums, places of worship, tourist enterprises, recreational facilities and private property.

Please note, while there are no Public Health Orders requiring the public to maintain physical distancing outside their own homes, the Province has provided strong recommendations and guidance.

Key Points

- The City's Bylaw Officers have been directed by the Province to provide assistance during the COVID-19
 pandemic by monitoring compliance and providing warnings associated with community facilities such as
 community halls, museums, places of worship, tourist enterprises, recreational facilities and private property.
- City of Nanaimo Bylaw Officers are not authorized to detain an individual as a result of a contravention or suspected contravention to a Public Heath Order. The City's bylaw officers are not authorized to issue a fine or penalty associated with a breach of the public health orders.
