Successful FireSmart weekend completed in Long Lake Heights

Residents work together to increase community resiliency against wildfires

Summary

Residents of Long Lake Heights Strata recently completed a successful FireSmart weekend where homeowners applied FireSmart principles to their homes and properties. In total, five 40-yard bins of potential fuel such as fallen branches and other dry vegetation were removed over the weekend.
