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Member of City's Culture Staff receives "Above & Beyond" award

Influx of new talent creates enhanced capacity to serve the community

Summary

The City of Nanaimo is pleased to announce that a member of Staff is the recipient of a 2020 Nanaimo Business Award. Manager of Culture & Events, Julie Bevan, is recognized for her work in a category called "Above & Beyond." According to the Nanaimo Chamber of Commerce, who presents the annual program, the award is given to a person who "most exemplifies excellence in the performance of their service. Excellence is defined as being a role model for others, inspiring others to work collaboratively and creatively, and promoting a work environment that is respectful, collegial and highly supportive."

Now in its 20th year, the Nanaimo Business Awards were originally scheduled to take place in April; however, the program was adapted to be presented virtually from the Port Theatre. The Nanaimo Chamber engaged Steve Patterson, CBC show host and comedian to headline the September 18 show, and awards were announced in 21 categories. Winners were determined by vote.

Julie Bevan was formerly the Executive Director at Nanaimo Art Gallery and left the position to take up a newly created role with the City in March of this year. She joined when organizational restructuring led the City's cultural services section to move and form Parks, Recreation and Culture.

Several other professionals have also joined the team this year, increasing its capacity to serve the community. Lynn Wark relocated from Campbell River for the role of Director, Recreation and Culture in March. She brings experience from the City of Campbell River where she played a lead role in cultural initiatives including a public art plan and heritage restorations. A new position focused on coordinating events in City venues was taken up by Michele Duerksen, who has previously worked in community recreation roles. Allison Collins, a curator, administrator, and writer who had been based in Vancouver, moved to Nanaimo for the position of Cultural Services Coordinator. Rebecca Buckler, who knows the Culture portfolio well, is continuing to provide administrative support and a high level of service to the individuals and organizations that participate in Culture services and programs.

With these organizational shifts and an influx of talent, the Culture team is well positioned to provide leadership and support on arts and culture, nurture relationships, build new collaborations, and evolve City programs like public art and grant funding while advancing the strategic priorities of the City. Over the summer, the team liaised with local non-profits to help them creatively adapt their events and projects in the context of COVID-19, and were responsible for the installation of over 10 public art projects at locations downtown, as well as a program that brought live music to local senior's residences. This fall the Culture team remains outwardly focused, touring and meeting staff at City-owned culture facilities, launching new channels of communication including a newsletter called LOVE ARTS NANAIMO, administering three grant funding programs, and facilitating other public art projects, including a significant new installation at Beban pool. The team is also mapping out October focus groups on arts and culture as part of REIMAGINE NANAIMO, the results of which will inform updates to City plans and guide action.

Strategic Link: Recent changes support Livability and Economic Health by "supporting arts, culture and recreation as an integral part of everyday life" and "creating a vibrant culture of innovation, stewardship and partnership to encourage a diverse and healthy economy now and into the future."
