Nanaimo responds to winter weather

City reminds residents to use caution when out in the snow

Summary

Nanaimo received between 18 and 24 inches of snow over the last four days, significantly more than typical for the City.

Roads:

Thank you for your patience during this winter weather event. Please continue to expect winter driving conditions and if you need to travel please ensure your vehicle is winter ready and equipped with winter tires. For further information please refer to our <u>Snow and Ice Control webpage</u>.

Snow Control Activities:

- Crews have been out continuously since Christmas Eve maintaining priority 1 routes.
- Local roads are packed with snow and winter driving conditions continue. Residents can expect local roads to
 have packed snow on driving surface for the foreseeable future as temperatures continue to be well below
 freezing. Please be prepared if you are going out.
- Since the snow stopped accumulating last night, crews have moved into residential areas.
- Please be patient as Crews work to service areas throughout the City.

Garbage, Recycling and Organics collection:

The City continues to monitor conditions to allow for the safe solid waste collection services. With current weather and ice conditions, delays and or adjustments to garbage collection schedules can be expected for at least Wednesday Dec 29. The City will be updating the City's website and the Nanaimo Recycles app

Strategic Link: Ensuring residents are prepared for the winter storm season supports a Liveable Community.

Key Points

- During snow events, the City of Nanaimo focuses on maintaining good winter driving conditions in a priority order: Priority 1 routes - emergency routes and all major roads; Priority 2 routes - secondary roads; and Priority 3 routes - residential culs-de-sac and dead ends.
- When snow plows and salt trucks are operating, drivers must keep back a safe distance and may not pass. To
 help plows clear a wider path on roads, residents can park in their driveways, or on even sides of the road on
 even days, and odd sides of the road on odd days.
- When possible, residents are encouraged to stay home during times of heavy snow or icy roads.

Quick Facts

- Stewart Avenue, Brechin Road, the Nanaimo Parkway (Highway 19) and the old Island Highway (19A),
 Pearson Bridge south and Brechin Rd north are maintained by the BC Ministry of Transportation
 Infrastructure. Please report any concerns or issues to 1-877-215-6006 or email midisland@mainroad.ca.
- Nanaimo's Roads and Traffic Services is responsible for maintaining approximately 1,100 lane kms of paved streets, and nearly 800 cul-de-sacs.
- Salt is only effective at melting ice down to -6 degrees Celsius. Brine (liquid salt solution) is used to prevent icing as well as preventing snow and ice from bonding to the road surface.
