Residents invited to participate in invasive plant awareness month

Summary

May is Invasive Plant Awareness Month in the City of Nanaimo, and residents are invited to participate in a variety of invasive plant removal work parties happening throughout the month, as well as bring invasive plants for disposal to the Drop Zone.

Invasive plants have the potential to negatively impact local ecosystems. Plants, such as English Ivy, Scotch Broom and Himalayan Blackberry, are well established in Nanaimo. Others, such as Knotweed and Giant Hogweed are spreading. The work parties will focus on the removal of Broom, Daphne and Ivy at various locations, including Diver Lake Park, Lotus Pinatus Park, Linley Valley Park, Sugarloaf Mountain and Bowen Park. Also, homeowners who remove invasive plants from their own property can bring them to the Drop Zone for safe disposal on Saturday, May 28, 2022, 10 am until 2 pm located at Bowen Park.
