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Pedestrian Safety Day is coming up in Nanaimo

Summary

The days are getting shorter and the weather is turning cold and wet. Together, these factors can greatly impact pedestrian safety. To help everyone stay safe this winter, the City of Nanaimo, the RCMP and ICBC are hosting Pedestrian Safety Day at the intersection of Front Street and Bastion Street on Friday, Oct. 28, between 11:30 am and 1 pm. The risks of distracted driving are well known, but pedestrian awareness while walking is also extremely important. Distracted walking is a dangerous activity. Pedestrians need to focus on being present; heads up, phones down, and headphones off when crossing the street and interacting with vehicles on the road.

Key Points

- Pedestrians are among the most vulnerable road users in a crash.
- Drivers should be ready to yield to pedestrians near crosswalks, transit stops and before turning at intersections.
- Pedestrians can help stay safe by making eye contact with drivers, using designated crosswalks and watching for vehicles turning at intersections.

Quick Facts

- Between October and January, pedestrian fatalities increase by an average of 54% in B.C.
- On Vancouver Island, 71% of crashes involving pedestrians happen at intersections.
- Crashes involving pedestrians happen most often on Thursdays and Fridays, in fall and winter, at intersections between 3 p.m. and 6 p.m.
