- The group was curious about the breakdown of funds used to purchase the property and whether those funds could be reallocated to establish housing elsewhere in the city.
- Questioned the impetus for putting housing on the site in the first place. What was the reasoning behind that decision?
- There is importance in acknowledging the history of the site. There is a disconnect from what was said during Phase 1 of engagement and what staff are showing now as options. There should be recognition given to Craig Evans.
- There is a real opportunity to elevate the importance of food security and food education on site.
- Farming and farmers are 'aging out'. It's becoming more and more difficult as a profession so there is a need to educate younger generations on farming practices.
- The city is generally not food resilient.
- Protecting the wetland and surrounding ecosystems is important from an environmental perspective, not just on the site but from a regional perspective. Housing/development will disrupt the natural cycles.
- Food Security Planning during Mining times.
- What is the position of the Regional District in making agricultural related decisions?
- A suggestion was made that we should try to reach 'balance' on site by allowing housing and agricultural practices. There is a lot of development occurring in the Agricultural Land Reserve which we should be trying to avoid.
- Acknowledging the site was identified as 'green space' in the 2013 Master Plan for the Neighbourhood.
- Nanaimo Food Share shares that this piece of land has many opportunities to partner with other non-profit organizations for doing traditional farming on site. There is a lot of interest.
- The location of this parcel is ideal for teaching farming and promoting urban agriculture.
- Lots of interest in the other piece of farmland off Bruce. Kirsty explains that property is not

owned by the city and is slated for development.

- Lots of discussion about the area of land available for farming, considering the size of the wetland and its protections, existing buildings, etc.
- Explain the purpose of the ALR.
- The city is facing impacts from climate change already which have a huge impact on our food systems (that and COVID). This problem will only continue to get worse. There needs to be an emphasis on food security.
- Nanaimo Association for Community Living explains the health benefits/outcomes for folks with disabilities after visiting the site. While they acknowledge the need for housing, they support the site being used for green space, education and farming.
- Nanaimo Food Share agrees with Community Living but suggests if housing does end up on the site, they will work with it.
- If the site remained as a farm there would be a beautiful opportunity to work with Snuneymuxw to re-introduce culturally appropriate food.
- Better explain wetland protections (e.g., setbacks etc.)

- Why isn't the existing house showing on option 5?
- Consider adding existing buildings to the site plan for detail.
- There has been interest in daylighting the existing stream to re-establish fish habitat.
- Has there been an assessment done of the existing house? Is it viable for reuse or is it a liability?
- How can we ensure farming doesn't pollute the wetland?
- Need to factor in farm infrastructure in final plan for site.
- A number of the groups in attendance noted preference for the site to be devoted to park/ agricultural use, with no onsite housing, including NACL, Food Share, Growing Opportunities and the Harewood Neighbourhood Association.
