Our City should fairly accommodate citizens of all ages, abilities, and walks of life. The City's **Advisory Committee** on Accessibility and Inclusiveness is working to move us towards a more inclusive Nanaimo.

The feeling of personal safety is critical for our well-being. Reducing crime rates and public disorder and creating safe public spaces for all are ongoing goals.


# WHAT DO OUR PLANS SAY NOW?

- Encourage social enrichment to create a socially sustainable community that nurtures a caring, healthy, inclusive, and safe environment and empowers all citizens to realize their aspirations.
- Use safe design principles and encourage a community that enhances personal safety for all.
- ► Create an environment that encourages an inclusive community with diverse neighbourhoods.
- ► Encourage the development of child, youth, elderly, and disabled-friendly public spaces and facilities.

- Support the development of social services, education facilities, and affordable and accessible health programs and facilities throughout our City.
- Work with other service providers and senior levels of government to put support services in place for residents in need of assistance.
- ▶ Identify barriers to inclusion and accessibility and work to remove these.
- Support an adequate supply of housing types that address the needs of all members of the community.

#### **OPPORTUNITIES**

- ► The City is working to actively engage with local Indigenous groups on Truth and Reconciliation Calls to Action.
- Social planning is aligning high-level social policies with concrete directions and actions towards change.
- ▶ Programs are being developed for early intervention and prevention of root causes of social challenges.
- Our <u>Affordable Housing Strategy</u> identifies more housing options including a wider range of residential uses, innovative housing forms, and varied tenures.
- ▶ Policies encourage better access to childcare.
- The City has established an <u>Advisory Committee on Accessibility and Inclusiveness</u> to promote social and political equity.
- Our society is taking steps towards a more equitable and inclusive society, but there is still much for us to learn and improve upon.





#### **CHALLENGES**

- Social issues are diverse, complex, and interconnected, requiring time, effort, and collaboration for progress to be made.
- Nanaimo has consistently low vacancy rates, making it more challenging for some to find housing.
- There is a growing population of people experiencing homelessness which is compounded by the opioid epidemic that has swiftly become a major health crisis.
- Ongoing population growth puts pressure on the housing supply in our City.
- ▶ It can be difficult to evenly distribute the benefits of economic growth.
- Childcare spaces continue to be challenging to secure, and it can be difficult to increase spaces at the right time in the right places they are needed.
