### Our Volunteers, hard at work...



# **Knotweed—Invasive Species Alert**

Japanese, Giant & Himalayan Knotweed are members of the buckwheat family (Polygonaceae) from eastern Asia and have hollow (except the Himalayan species), upright, bamboo like stems growing to 3 to 16 feet. Knotweeds thrive in roadside ditches, water drainage systems, irrigation canals, They are also found in riparian areas, along stream banks, and in other low lying areas with high soil moisture.

Impact on humans and the environment: The species forms dense stands that crowd out all other vegetation, degrading native plant and animal habitat & can create a fire hazard in the dormant season. It is difficult to control because it has extremely vigorous rhizome roots that form a deep, dense mat. & can re-sprout from fragments.

#### What should you do?

Please report any sightings of this species to the contacts below.

- Spread the word, not the weed: don't purchase, grow or trade knotweed, use soil and gravel that are not contaminated
- Avoid: digging and cutting this species as this can cause further spread.
- Wash: plant parts and seeds from vehicles, equipment and personal gear before leaving infested sites.
- **Dispose:** of any knotweed parts and contaminated soils in the proper manner

#### Mesh Net Knotweed Control Trial Underway

As part of the City's Invasive Plant Management Program, two sites within Bowen Park are currently part of a study being coordinated through the Province of BC to assess the use of steel netting as a containment & control method for Knotweed within riparian areas. The trial involves monitoring the re-growth of knotweed along the Millstone River that have a steel mesh net anchored over them. The mesh net is expected to restrict the growth and spread of the Knotweed. It is hoped this technique will offer a method to contain the growth of knotweed along sensitive riparian habitats, where the use of herbicides is not allowed.
