## **NS3 Trash to Treasures**

This year over 300 students from Ladysmith/Nanaimo school district participated in the Great Shoreline Clean-up, cleaning up 11 sites and approximately 500kg of trash!!!. They have taken the trash they collected and turned it into Art. These unique pieces of art will be available for viewing at Wildfoods Festival & Earthday Celebration this Saturday, April 23.

### **NS3 Citizen Science Program**

In May and June, Grade 5 students from throughout SD68 will be participating in a citizen science project developed by NS3 and researchers from VIU. Students will be collecting data on



the distribution and abundance of Varnish Clams, an invasive species, and of other local bivalves at Departure Bay Beach. During low tides at Departure Bay Beach. This data will contribute to a long-term monitoring study being carried out at VIU.
